# 2.0 Draft Proposed Source Protection Plan

#### **Recommendation:**

That the Mississippi-Rideau Source Protection Committee approves the Draft Proposed Source Protection Plan and directs staff to post it for public consultation.

### Background

Across Ontario, Source Protection Committees (SPC) are working with municipalities, farmers, property owners, businesses, industries, First Nations, environmental groups, Provincial Ministries and the general public. Together they are developing policies to prevent the contamination and overuse of lakes, rivers and aquifers where they supply drinking water.

#### 2006 to 2010

Source Protection Committees completed Assessment Reports that:

- Mapped local sources of drinking water (primarily municipal drinking water);
- Determined how vulnerable these sources are to contamination; and
- Identified types of land use activities that could pose a contamination risk

#### 2011 to 2012

Source Protection Committees have now developed draft Source Protection Plans

- Policies will protect sources of drinking water (primarily municipal drinking water)
- Policies will apply in areas where drinking water sources are vulnerable to contamination
- Policies will address land use activities that pose a contamination risk

### Where Will Policies Apply?

Land use activities can only be considered drinking water threats if they are taking place in a vulnerable area. Policies in the Mississippi-Rideau region will apply in:

- Wellhead Protection Areas
  - o vulnerable area around a municipal well
- Intake Protection Zones
  - o vulnerable area upstream of a municipal surface water intake
- Highly Vulnerable Aquifers
  - o Areas where groundwater is vulnerable to surface contaminants

Maps of these areas are on the Assessment Report page of our website www.mrsourcewater.ca

Source Protection Plans:

- Must contain policies to address significant drinking water threats; and
- <u>May</u> contain policies to address <u>moderate and low</u> drinking water threats.

Activities can only be considered a significant threat close to a municipal well or intake in a

- Wellhead Protection Areas; or
- Intake Protection Zones

# What is Considered a Threat?

The province determined that under certain circumstances the following land use activities can be considered drinking water threats if occurring in certain vulnerable areas:

- Waste disposal sites (including the application of untreated septage to land)
- Sewage storage, treatment, transmission or disposal
- Agricultural source material (e.g. manure) storage, management or application
- Non-agricultural source material (e.g. biosolids) storage, handling or application
- Farm animal pasturing, grazing, outdoor confinement areas or farm yards
- Fertilizer storage, handling or application
- Pesticide storage, handling or application
- Fuel storage or handling
- Dense Non-aqueous Phase Liquids (DNAPLSs) storage or handling
- Organic solvents storage or handling
- Road salt storage, handling or application
- Snow storage
- Airplane de-icing

To be a threat most of these activities must involve a minimum amount of material, be occurring on a minimum size area and/or involve a certain type of chemical. These threat criteria or "circumstances" are listed in provincial tables accessible on the "Assessment Report" page of our website (<u>www.mrsourcewater.ca</u>)

### What are the Policy Tools?

Policies to address drinking water threats can use one or more of the following tools. Some tools can only be used to address significant drinking water threats.

# How Will Policies Be Developed?

In the Mississippi-Rideau region, source protection plans were developed in four stages:

- 1. Draft Policies:
  - o Municipal staff, SPC members, sector experts and staff developed draft policies
- 2. Draft Policies
  - Draft policies were circulated to all implementing bodies (municipalities, ministries, health units) for review and comment
  - Draft policies were also shared with potentially affected property owners via letter and the general public at open houses
  - The Committee considered all comments received and revised the policies where possible to address concerns and suggestions
- 3. Draft Source Protection Plans
  - The draft Plan will be posted for a 35 day public comment period
  - Four open houses will be held to solicit comments
  - All comments will be considered by the Committee and revisions made to the Plan where possible to address concerns and suggestions.
- 4. Proposed Source Protection Plans
  - The proposed Plan will be posted for a 30 public comment period
  - All comments will be submitted to the MOE for their consideration when reviewing the Plan for approval

### **Consultation Schedule**

If the Committee approves the Draft Source Protection Plan at their March 22, 2012 meeting:

- The draft Plan and draft Explanatory Document would be posted on the web site by March 30, 2012
- Newspaper ads would appear at the same time advertising the 35 day consultation period
- Shortly thereafter, letters would be mailed to all policy implementers and potentially affected property owners inviting their comments.
- Open houses would be held the third week of April
- Comments would be accepted until May 4, 2012

The Committee would then consider all comments received.

- At their June 7 meeting they would approve a proposed Plan and Explanatory Document
- These would be posted mid June for a 30 day comment period ending mid July

The Source Protection Authorities would then approve the documents for submission to the MOE at their joint July 26, 2012 meeting

• The proposed documents would be submitted to the MOE at the end of July

# Background

Source Protection Plans must be accompanied by a companion "Explanatory Document" which outlines the reasons and rationale for each policy choice. The Committee reviewed a preliminary draft version of the Explanatory Document at their March 1, 2012 meeting. Comments have been incorporated.

### **Explanatory Document Content**

Ontario Regulation 287/07 sets out six items that must be included in Explanatory Documents:

- 1. Reasons for prohibiting an existing activity
- 2. How climate change considerations impacted policies
- 3. Reasons for each policy
- 4. Statement that non-regulatory measure is sufficient to address a significant threat
- 5. How financial implications affected policy decisions
- 6. Summary of comments received
